Farm Rescue assists farmers in times of need

Just like a good friend who is there for you when you need help, Farm Rescue is there to help farmers when they need help.

Farm Rescue volunteers recently worked west of Ipswich, at the Artie and Delaine Nehlich farm. Artie had been hospitalized with colon surgery, followed by further complications.

The Farm Rescue was there to do the spring planting for the Nehlichs. They seeded 600 acres of corn and 300 acres of soybeans, according to Farm Rescue founder Bill Gross.

Farm Rescue is an organization that plants and harvests crops free of charge for farm families that have experienced a major illness, injury or natural disaster. Their

operation is funded by donations, sponsorships and grants. Several area businesses are among the 2011 sponsors. RDO Equipment provides the John Deere equipment and maintenance for their work. North Central Farmers Elevator also donates to the organization as a gold sponsor. Other sponsors who serve the local area include Lamar Signs, Land O'Lakes Foundation, Dacotah Bank, South Dakota Wheat Growers, Farm Credit Services of America and Walmart.

The Nehlichs' farm was their last stop in South Dakota. After the Farm Rescue crew finished their work late on May 10, they were heading to North Dakota and Minnesota. Gross said they had a long spring coming up, with 15 cases to complete.
