Stories of Assistance

GARY AND BARBARA CARSTENS - Charles City, IA: Gary and Barb Carstens have operated their farm near Charles City, IA since the early 1980s. In addition to growing crops and raising livestock, the Carstens also own and operate a grain dryer company in nearby New Hampton. On an early spring morning, Gary was out checking cows in a pasture near their farmyard when one of the cows became startled. She kicked her hind legs, connecting with Gary's knee and propelling him onto the ground. After attempting to stand on the leg, it became apparent he had sustained significant structural damage. After an early-April surgery to repair the knee, the Carstens focused on the many tasks ahead during calving and planting that would need to be accomplished without Gary's involvement. Thanks to help from neighbors, Barb navigated the remainder of calving season and the couple

turned their attention to their corn and soybean crops. Thanks to a family friend, the Carstens were made aware of Farm Rescue and its free planting assistance services. Local John Deere dealer, Bodensteiner Implement, helped connect Gary and Barb with the Farm Rescue office and soon after, they submitted an application for assistance. Their approval came swiftly, and the couple began collaborating with Farm Rescue's staff on a game plan for seeding their corn and soybeans. Volunteers delivered Farm Rescue's John Deere 8R tractor to the Carstens farm to power their efforts, and Bodensteiner Implement further extended its support by sponsoring use of a 24-row planter. After several days of work, the Carstens crops were in the ground and Farm Rescue's volunteers and equipment were on to the next farm in need of assistance.



CLIFFORD AND KAREN FROSLIE – Rothsay, MN: Like many farmers and ranchers, Clifford and Karen Froslie have always taken pride in being self-sufficient in their operation. Throughout the past four decades, they've worked together to raise many wheat, soybean and corn crops on their Rothsay, MN farm. The growing season of 2022 began in the usual fashion, as the Froslies watched their planted fields progress nicely throughout the summer. Unfortunately, with harvest just around the corner, the family was dealt a difficult hand when Clifford was diagnosed with esophageal cancer. Over the next several weeks, he received daily radiation treatments and weekly chemotherapy to combat the disease, with additional surgery to follow. The Froslies knew it was time to accept a bit of help. With encouragement from friends and family, the couple submitted an application to Farm Rescue. Soon after, volunteers and equipment were dispatched to help bring in the family's corn crop. The crew also received additional trucking and grain cart support from two helpful sons-in-law, as well as Clifford's brother. Farm Rescue was happy to extend a helping

hand to this wonderful family, as they focused on the greater battle at hand.

RODNEY AND KRISTIN COLE – Roberts, MT: Farm Rescue was created to help farm families in crisis — a key word being "families". These operations rely on the work and dedication of several individuals to keep things afloat. When any individual is removed from the equation due to injury or illness, the impact is unmistakable. Other family members pick up the slack and shoulder a much heavier workload to compensate, but this can create a tremendous amount of stress and fatigue over time. This was the case for the Cole family near Roberts, MT after husband, Rodney, was diagnosed with a very rare blood disorder. He was told he could only receive replacement blood from a donor with the same disorder or the result could be fatal. After a nationwide search, the hospital and Red Cross were able to track down a supply of this rare blood type to begin Rodney's treatment regimen. Unfortunately, this process required a lengthy stay in a Billings hospital during a very busy time on their farm. Throughout the next few months, his wife, Kristin, singlehandedly carried their operation through calving season and irrigation of several hundred acres of hay ground. With this crucial cattle feed waiting to be gathered, the couple decided it was time to contact Farm Rescue. One of our devoted volunteers worked some long days to bring in the family's







Farm\Rescue 2022 Good Samaritan Awards



Kenneth Chyle was born and raised on a family farm near Auburn, KY, where he still resides today. He says his childhood years mainly revolved around farming and church. After his father's passing in 1957, Nine-year-old Kenneth joined his older brother, Robert, in continuing the family operation. In addition to milking cows twice a day for many years, the brothers raised Black Angus cattle, tobacco, wheat, corn and soybeans, as well as operating a used machinery business. Kenneth is also a military veteran. Around 15 years ago, Kenneth was introduced to one of his greatest passions when a magazine article about Farm Rescue caught his eye. After a bit of online research, he decided to sign up as a volunteer. In his first year serving with Farm Rescue, Kenneth originally planned for a 2-week trip to assist during planting season. After doing such an impressive job, he was asked to stay on for a full month as a team leader. Kenneth has returned each year since, often making multiple trips to Farm Rescue's service states throughout the growing season to assist families in crisis with planting, harvest and hay hauling support. He has impacted the lives of dozens of farm families and continues to be one of the nonprofit's most devoted and knowledgeable volunteers. Kenneth is now in his 13th year of service with Farm Rescue.



Mark Baumgarten was raised on a family farm near Casselton, ND. He and his two sisters helped tend to a thousand acres of land, as well as stock cows and hogs. Mark says much like his father, he was born a farmer, but chose to attend North Dakota State University in pursuit of an engineering degree. After graduation from NDSU, Mark was hired by John Deere and spent 36 years with the company. Several years back, Mark's wife, Jackie, read a magazine article about Farm Rescue and encouraged him to sign up. Mark began serving Farm Rescue that same year. His talents and knowledge were quickly recognized and he was asked to serve as a team leader in his first spring of volunteering. Mark typically serves for two weeks each year during the spring planting season, but has also assisted with harvest operations. Outside the field, he has been a great recruiter of additional volunteers. More than a dozen current or retired John Deere employees have followed Mark's lead in serving our mission. He also played a key role in cultivating our early relationship with John Deere leadership. Mark has devoted additional time to the organization by developing volunteer training manuals, manning booths at various farm shows and events, as well as performing outreach on behalf of our nonprofit. Mark is now in his 10th year of service with Farm Rescue.



The Good Samaritan Award was created in 2016 to honor individuals who support Farm Rescue with the compassionate heart of the Good Samaritan. Farm Rescue is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that provides planting, haying, harvesting or livestock feeding assistance free of charge for farm and ranch families who have experienced a major illness, injury or natural disaster. Services also include hay and grain hauling. Operations are funded by donations, business sponsorships and grants. Experienced volunteers comprise the organization's field workforce.
