Farm Rescue assists Leier family with field work

Farm Rescue volunteers traveled to Larry Leier's farm in the Hague area to assist him with some of his spring planting work.

Farm Rescue is a non-profit organization which provides planting and harvesting assistance for family farmers who are in a crisis due to major injury, illness or natural disaster.

The organization is funded by donations, grants and sponsors. The contributions are used to pay for the many costs of planting and harvesting a crop.

The organization was founded by Bill Gross, of Cleveland, N.D., in 2006.

Farm Rescue helps farmers in North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana and western Minnesota. They currently have helped 133 farmers in those four states with field work.

The organization will plant or harvest up to 1,000 acres for each farmer. Farm Rescue planted 165 acres of spring wheat for Leier.

The organization provides volunteers and the equipment for the farmer, but the farmer is responsible for providing some fuel for the tractor, fertilizer and seed.

Farm Rescue came to the farm to assist Larry and Rosalind Leier because they have two children, Nathan and Alissa, with Friedreich's Ataxia, a rare inherited, progressive nervous system disorder.

The workers who volunteered their time to assist the Leiers included Dave Sette from Grafton, Wis., Dave Hertl from Chandler, Ariz., RDO representative and volunteer Brian Verkuehlen from Casselton and Gross.
