Farm Rescue comes to Logan County

Farm Rescue is an organization helping family farmers in crisis by providing equipment and manpower free of charge. Volunteers assist to provide planting, haying and harvesting assistance for farmers who have experienced a major injury, illness or natural disaster.

Bill Gross, founder of Farm Rescue and formerly of Cleveland, ND, followed his heart and answered a concern of

farmer's, 'what would happen to the farm should anything interfere with the operation'. In 2005 the organization with the help of volunteers was created to help farm families in rural communities in North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa and eastern Montana. By the end of 2014 over 300 farm families will have been served by Farm Rescue and sponsors.

When the 'Farmer' at the Knecht Farm was injured by a cow, the stress of wheat harvest was unsure. Thankfully, the Burkle's (Jon, Corey and Mike) completed the haying and came to assist Norman Kleingartner with the cows. What to do next?
